They depart for Japan on July 9th, and return on July 30th. We look forward to sharing pictures of their adventures with you in the August Newsletter.

We will be gathering our Host Families together for an orientation meeting on July 23rd, in anticipation of the arrival of the Kashiwa student ambassadors in August. When they are here, we will show them the best of Torrance and other Southern California highlights. Our members and host families are welcome to join them on various outings, as space on the bus permits. Check our website on or after July 23rd for details!

Every year the Torrance student delegation is accompanied on their journey by an Adult Leader who has experience with youth and an interest in Japan. We are beginning our search for the Summer 2025 Adult Leader already! The application deadline is July 8, which is already upon us, but we will actually interview in

August. So, if you have a strong interest in leading next year's student delegation, contact us right away through our website, and we will do our best to fit you into the selection process, if possible.

Our program for English teachers will also be going through a selection and recruitment process later this year. There are two positions to teach English in a Kashiwa high school, with overlapping two year terms, so that the new teacher can work with a teacher who has a year of experience. Greetings, Torrance Community!

As some of you may remember, I first ventured into the Ichikashi exchange program back in 2018 as a student. Now, returning as a teacher, the experience feels doubly significant. As a student, I was so absorbed in my own adventures that I never

considered what our chaperones did in their free time. Little did I know, they were engaging in their own cultural exchanges, often marked by flushed cheeks and post-gathering giggles. Ah, the elusive teacher gatherings, a mystery to us students, now revealed to me as moments of camaraderie and shared laughter. It was a pleasure to join my former teachers, Mr. Barth, Ms. Whorley, and Mrs. Nicholes, for a drink... or six. Conversing with them as peers, albeit with the honorific titles intact, was a poignant reminder of the lasting impact educators like them have on our lives. It's reassuring to see North High School continues to have such exceptional mentors.

Looking back on our eventful week together, filled with a diverse array of activities — from the artistry of calligraphy and the discipline of judo to the flavors of cooking classes and the serenity of traditional tea ceremonies — watching the current students forge their connections evokes a sense of timeless continuity, where each interaction mirrors those of past and future participants. Our escapade to Disneyland added an extra layer of joy to our shared experiences, leaving us with memories to treasure. As we gathered at Haneda Airport on Friday to bid farewell, memories of my own departure from Japan came rushing back. Seeing my students tearfully embrace their newfound friends from Torrance stirred a profound sense of connection within me. I recalled the heaviness in my heart as I left behind dear friends, uncertain of when we would meet again. Yet, here I stand, a witness to the cyclical nature of reunions and farewells.

One student eloquently captured the essence of our bonds in her reflection, articulating how, despite language barriers, our hearts found a common language.

Though I wanted to impart some wisdom as we parted ways, I hesitated, not wanting to interrupt their farewells. Instead, I offer these words to the students of North High and Ichikashi now:



As I sat on my flight back to Torrance in 2018, my mind wandered to the experiences I had just left behind in Japan. It was during those moments of reflection that I found myself pondering the underlying purpose of sister city relationships. What emerged from my thoughts was a realization that transcended mere diplomatic niceties.

You see, it became clear to me that while government-to-government diplomacy serves a function, it often lacks the depth and authenticity needed to foster enduring connections. Instead, it's the personal interactions, the genuine exchanges between individuals, that lay the foundation for true friendship and understanding between cities and countries.

When we engage in these exchanges, two things happen. Firstly, we come face to face with our differences, especially in culture. These differences actually enrich our lives, broadening our perspectives and deepening our appreciation for the diversity of our world. Second, and perhaps even more importantly, through these interactions, we discover just how much we have in common. Despite language barriers and cultural nuances, we find shared values, shared dreams, and shared aspirations that unite us as human beings.

It's through our shared experiences, whether it's exploring new cuisines, learning traditional arts, or simply engaging in heartfelt conversations, that we begin to see progress. Progress not just in terms of diplomatic relations, but in our collective journey towards greater empathy, understanding, and unity.

Your participation in this program is more than just a fleeting moment in time; it's another chapter in the enduring friendship between our two cities. Each interaction, each exchange, adds another layer to the rich tapestry of connections that bind Torrance and Kashiwa together.

So, as you embark on the next chapter of your journey, know that you carry with you a piece of this shared history.

Whether you find yourself back in the Land of the Rising Sun or exploring new horizons, remember that you carry with you the bonds of friendship formed during your time here. These bonds, forged in the crucible of shared experiences and heartfelt connections, will serve as a source of strength and support wherever life may lead you. さよなら

Association (KIRA) for my 20 years contribution as a volunteer. I would like to extend my heartfelt thanks to all my friends in Torrance and Kashiwa for having me in the program that has been so rewarding and inspirational. Torrance and Kashiwa celebrated their

50-year sister city relationship last year, and I am extremely honored to have been part of the program that develops the ties between the two cities.

After my retirement, I was delighted to come across KIRA as I had a special attachment to Torrance. I used to work in a shipping company for over 40 years, and from 1988 to 2000, I was posted to Port of Long Beach, California, where I managed a container terminal company. Long Beach is just an hour drive from Torrance, and I used to go there quite frequently to meet people and to eat at restaurants. I knew that Torrance is a sister city of Kashiwa, my hometown, so I always had a friendly feeling towards the city.

KIRA has been like a breath of fresh air for me. As I was a busy 'salary-man' for most of my adult life, I never had the chance to get to know the community I live in. KIRA gave me the opportunity to collaborate with people outside work for the first time, which was truly enlightening and enjoyable. What impressed me most was the enthusiasm of my fellow volunteers, and their dedication and commitment to providing the best possible experience for students.

You can imagine how difficult it has been for me to learn how to attach a photo to an email, or share photos online. I had to ask for help from my family and friends countless times. I really appreciate their patience and unfailing support. I am now 89 years old, and I thought I am finished with learning, but I was wrong.

I sincerely hope that the sister city relationships between Torrance and Kashiwa will continue to prosper, and that the international friendship and goodwill between the two cities will grow even stronger. Thanks again for the Long-term voluntary award. I will be happy if I can serve as a volunteer to this important program for years to come.









Teach English

in Kashiwa, Japan

The Torrance Sister City Association seeks qualified applicants for one high school English teacher in Kashiwa, Japan, the Sister City of Torrance. A minimum one-year contract runs from August 1, 2025, to July 31, 2026. The contract is renewable for a maximum three-year assignment.

Duties: Conduct and assist in a variety of English conversation classes; assist with coordinating campus visits by parents, administrators, and junior high students; and assist with extracurricular activities, which may include judging and assisting with speech contests, serving as adviser to the English Conversation Club and business trips, and coaching students for college interviews. Volunteer work with KIRA (Kashiwa International Relations Association) and other city groups may also be required.

Qualifications

Applicants must:

- Live or work in Torrance
- Be fluent in written and spoken English
- Hold a Bachelor's degree plus a teaching credential or have demonstrated teaching experience
- Possess a keen interest in the Japanese language and culture
- Represent the Torrance Sister City Association and foster the goals and objectives of the English Teacher Exchange Program.

Compensation

- Annual salary of approximately 4,800,000 Japanese yen
- One-way airfare from Los Angeles to Japan
- National health insurance (deducted from monthly salary)
- Subsidized housing and transportation allowance
- Paid Japanese holidays and personal days
