Saturday, January 11th, we held our annual Alumni Reunion Luncheon at the Ken Miller Recreation Center. The event began with a speech by TSCA President Karen Wheeler, in which she acknowledged and thanked outgoing board members. City councilman, Jeremy Gerson, a former adult leader welcomed everyone on behalf of the city council.

Afterwards, Karen introduced City of Torrance City Clerk, Rebecca Poirier, who installed TSCA's new board members. Karen then invited Mallory Beard, the adult leader of the 2024 student exchange, to officially introduce Clay Bakhoum, the adult leader for this year's annual student cultural exchange, who shared a few words about himself and about his appreciation for his selection.

Afterwards, the lunch began, and prospective delegates were able to talk with past delegates, selection committee members, and other TSCA community members as all enjoyed the potluck provided by luncheon attendees. October 2024 presented our first opportunity to return to Japan in 26 years! During this trip, we were able to reconnect in Kashiwa with KIRA friends and some of Dai Sup's former Kashiwa Municipal High School co-workers/teachers. It was such a meaningful time to share about past and present happenings in our lives. Mrs. Doi and Mrs. Fujiwara also took the time to show us the current KIRA offices.

We did not recognize much in the neighborhood where we used to live but it was lovely to see the new neighborhood where the current TSCA teachers reside.

We will be forever grateful to TSCA for connecting us to Kashiwa. It is a testament to the dedication of people in both Torrance and Kashiwa that so many continue to be involved in the Sister City mission and in fostering beautiful cross-cultural friendships!

PS - In addition to these wonderful reunions, we experienced quite the serendipitous event. Dear Japanese friends had planned to take us on a day trip to one of their favorite places called Fujiyoshida...which happens to be the Sister City of our current city, Colorado Springs!



Reflections on a Year Abroad in Japan by Peter Abina

Recently, I had the opportunity to take a nearly three-week trip back home to Los Angeles. It had been a year and one month since I had last set foot in my home city. When I first woke up in my bed, my time in Japan felt like a fever dream. It was as though I had never left. It was so easy to jump back into a jam-packed schedule because of all my friends and family. Every moment of those three weeks, from 8 a.m. to midnight, was spent with someone I love.

During that time, all of the things I once disliked about L.A. suddenly became endearing. Yes, there's a lot of traffic, and gas is expensive, but the absolute freedom that comes with having a car is unmatched. Driving around, blasting my favorite music, and knowing I could go anywhere at any moment reminded me of the unique independence California offers. The geography of California—its sheer variety—is something I had forgotten to fully appreciate. On Christmas morning, I woke up in the mountains at Big Bear and later that night went stargazing with friends in the Joshua Tree desert. These moments reminded me of how lucky I am to live near such natural beauty.

I also took for granted the simple, spontaneous conversations I could have with strangers—at the gym, while ordering food, or even standing at a taco stand. These interactions are so much a part of life in L.A., and I found myself cherishing them more deeply during my visit.

However, my time in Japan was far from a fever dream. In the year I've spent abroad, I've learned so much about myself and adopted habits that have become an intrinsic part of who I am. Patience has been my biggest takeaway—patience with myself and with others. Life moves at a different pace in Japan. Although people are busy with their day-to-day lives, the reliance on public transportation, biking, and walking means there are natural pauses built into the day. These moments allow for reflection, observation, or simply a chance to breathe.

Driving offers a sense of freedom, but it can also be isolating. When you're behind the wheel, it's hard to focus on anything beyond the road in front of you. On public transport, however, you have a chance to lift your head, look around, and put things into perspective. It also fosters a sense of connection; when you're literally shoulder to shoulder with others, you become more conscious of the shared humanity around you.

Japan has also taught me to be more mindful of what I put into my body. I've come to understand how food affects both my physical health and my mental clarity. Miso soup is now a staple of my diet, and I've developed a love for vegetables and the countless ways they can be incorporated into meals. These lessons are ones I plan to carry with me for the rest of my life.

Perhaps most importantly, I've learned how to enjoy my own company. While I've made great friends here, doing things alone is much more common in Japan, and many restaurants and establishments are designed with solo patrons in mind. This cultural difference has helped me become more comfortable and confident in spending time by myself.

Over the past year I've learned that it's not about where you are in the world, but how you choose to engage with the life around you. Whether in the bustling streets of Los Angeles or the serene countryside of Japan, meaning and connection come from appreciating the small moments, embracing new experiences, and being present. Happiness and fulfillment are not tied to geography but to your mindset and the people you surround yourself with.

As we step into 2025, the Year of the Snake, which symbolizes new beginnings, I'm reminded of how life is constantly evolving. We are now equally close to 2050 as we are to 2000, and the world is changing rapidly. I encourage you all to take moments to pause, look around, and appreciate the people and places that surround you. Let's remember that we are all living on this planet together. I hope 2025 brings joy, growth, and connection to each of you. Thank you for being part of my journey!

Teach English

in Kashiwa, Japan

The Torrance Sister City Association seeks qualified applicants for one high school English teacher in Kashiwa, Japan, the Sister City of Torrance. A minimum one-year contract runs from August 1, 2025, to July 31, 2026. The contract is renewable for a maximum three-year assignment.

Duties: Conduct and assist in a variety of English conversation classes; assist with coordinating campus visits by parents, administrators, and junior high students; and assist with extracurricular activities, which may include judging and assisting with speech contests, serving as adviser to the English Conversation Club and business trips, and coaching students for college interviews. Volunteer work with KIRA (Kashiwa International Relations Association) and other city groups may also be required.

Qualifications

Applicants must:

- Live or work in Torrance
- Be fluent in written and spoken English
- Hold a Bachelor's degree plus a teaching credential or have demonstrated teaching experience
- Possess a keen interest in the Japanese language and culture
- Represent the Torrance Sister City Association and foster the goals and objectives of the English Teacher Exchange Program.

Compensation

- Annual salary of approximately 4,800,000 Japanese yen
- One-way airfare from Los Angeles to Japan
- National health insurance (deducted from monthly salary)
- Subsidized housing and transportation allowance
- Paid Japanese holidays and personal days
